Frequently Asked Questions



Enhancing the Beach for Your Next Visit

While Nags Head's coastline is beautiful, it is also very delicate. Storms, high winds, and tidal changes contribute to beach erosion. To restore our fragile coastline, the Town of Nags Head is implementing a critical beach nourishment project from June 2011 through October 2011. The Town has been working diligently to bring this project to fruition for many years. We hope you understand how important beach nourishment is to our community's future. We are truly sorry for any inconvenience the project may cause during your visit. Please return soon to see its wonderful results.

What is beach nourishment?

Beach nourishment involves the dredging and placement of large amounts of sand from offshore onto the beach from Mile Post 11 through Mile Post 21 in Nags Head. The goal of the project is to advance the shoreline anywhere from 50-125 feet.

How will beach nourishment affect my visit to Nags Head?

If you are visiting Nags Head from June through October 2011, and your oceanfront rental is located south of the Bonnett Street public beach access (near Mile Post 11), you may be affected by the project. (Detailed location information - if

your property is on S. Virginia Dare Trail in the 3000 block or higher or anywhere on S. Old Oregon Inlet Road, you may witness this project.)

Depending upon the location of the sand pumping operations, you may experience some temporary construction noise and beach diversions. Please be patient with our much needed project – it is vital to our town's success.

How can I get the most current information on where the sand pumping is taking place?

Will they pump sand onto the beach in more than one place at a time?

Because we have such a short weather window in which to complete the project, there may be more than one section of our beach affected at a time.

How long will construction affect my property?

About 500 hundred feet of beach will be impacted at one time during construction. Once a section is pumped into place it will be re-opened for use within 24-48 hours. Sand ramps will be placed over the pipeline at every public access and then in intervals of 200-300 feet, allowing people to get across and place their tow-

els seaward of the pipeline. There will be a wider dry sand beach after nourishment, giving people large areas seaward of the pipeline to enjoy. The newly built beach may be a bit darker than the old beach, but it will quickly bleach out from the sun.

Will I be able to get to the beach while the project is underway?

Yes! If construction is directly in front of your property, you will be able to walk just a short distance to get to the beach. Or, you may take the opportunity to visit Coquina beach, just south of Nags Head, Jockey's Ridge State Park, or the new Jennette's Pier!

Do they work certain days of the week or certain hours of the day?

The contractor will work 24/7, depending on weather conditions.

Is construction noisy?

You will be able to tell when construction operations are underway in front of your property. The sounds you will typically hear are the back up alarms from bulldozers and trucks, which are required by federal law.

Why do the work in the summer?

Frequent late fall, winter, and early spring storms make working off our shore very dangerous. The summer and early fall are the safest times to perform the work.
